- e) Assess the contribution of Langland to Middle English literature.



 - a) Critically comment on the Epitaph of Gray's 'Elegy'.
 - b) How has Blake depicted the act of divine creation in Tyger'?
 - c) Why has Blake used the word "Charter'd" in 'London' twice?
 - d) How does The Solitude of Alexander Selkirk' suggest a harmony between man and nature at the end?
 - e) Explain —
